Below websites of how to prepare, plant, care, and maintain a meadow and/or wildflower garden. Wildflowers can be planted in a field for a meadow...or to replace a flower garden for lower maintence...or for establishing your garden for a pollinator garden and enrich our plants and trees that require the helping hand of all the types of pollinators, be it birds, butterflies or insects. Preparation of the soil is key to ever-after maintence. There is one school of thought that the wildflowers should not be watered as it opens up the seed and then becomes broken down before it germinates. The Oklahoma Wildflower Assoc. believes in this method in their widespread planting of wildflower plots. The other videos and those below show watering. The other very important detail is to read carefully any wildflower mixes to see the types of seeds listed and how many different types of varieties are included. A high number like approx. 28 furnishes so many types in which you can observe which types are conducive to your gardening soil and location. So many seed mixtures have a lot of filler (weeds) which you will have naturally. It is a clever trick to sow your seeds with a silver sand (a sandbox or builders sand) which does not have salt in them). It helps distribute the seeds evenly and you can see where the white sand is on the darker soil of where you have sown. These websites have countless other sidebars that you may access if you wish including countless videos.

October Gardening Tips:

- Update your garden journal with how new plant did over the summer, transplants, placement of new bulbs, date of first frost, etc.
- After or near first frost cut back peonies, phlox and other herbaceous perennials to the ground.
- Fresh fallen leaves are your best fall mulch, either composted or mulched with mower.
- Clean up you vegetable gardens of dead debris and plant a cover crop. It will improve the soil, help control the growth of cool weather weeds, and lessen soil compaction. Crimson clover and buckwheat make good cover crops.
