January is a good time to contemplate the benefits of growing and having house plants. Finding time to take care of house plants in the spring and summer when our gardens call to us, make winter a good time to give our plants some tender loving care, and/or to select some new plants, for aesthetics and health benefits. Also in winter a slightly warm shower for most house plants is a great idea for healthy plants (as well as putting some moisture in our homes). If repotting, make sure to scrub your container and let soak in a little bleach solution to kill potential problems. Gently wash the plant in some mild soapy water by submerging the plant and not forgetting to include gently washing the back of the leaves.

#### **January Gardening Tips:**

- Remove any remaining foliage from last year's perennials and dispose in a trach bag. This will reduce the chance of any pest from infecting your new growth this spring.
- Check perennial plants for frost heave; tamp down and apply mulch, if needed.
- To prevent breakage, remove snow from evergreen braches as soon as possible by gently tapping the underside of braches with a broom before snow freezes on the branches.
- No fertilization of plants indoors or outside is required in January.
- To protect your fingernails when gardening, insert into each garden glove fingertip a rubber fingertip cover like the ones used by ban tellers use to count money. This will help your manicure as well as your fingernails last a little longer.
